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Kent Police Model

16th November 2011

Kent Police response to the financial challenge it faces over the next four years.

Plan to meet the needs of the Comprehensive Spending Review (CSR) requirement to save £50m over the next 4 years. 1,000 less support staff, 500 less police officers.



Three goals of Chief Constable:

- continued delivery of high quality policing services to the people of Kent and Medway.
- retaining an engaged and supportive work force.
- achieving the budgetary requirements.

Although structured differently, you still have a:

- strategic police lead – T/Chief Supt. Andrew Rabey (West Kent Divisional Commander)
- dedicated ownership of issues in your district – Chief Inspector Peter Steenhuis
- police service that provides critical support for emergency response, problem solving and partnership activity



Increased front-line efficiency,
Provide coordinated service delivery through collaboration.
Reduce cost by radically changing the four elements of service delivery by which the people of Kent and Medway come into contact with the police.

These four elements are:

- the Force Control Room (FCR)
- Response
- Neighbourhood
- Crime Groups

Force Control Room

Contact through 101, Police Switchboard 01622 690690 or 999 emergency.
Operate Immediate, High and Appointment system.

Immediate and High – Borderless concept, Central Response command, Placement plan.

Appointment – Diary car attendance – Neighbourhood Police Constable, crime or incident.



Central Response

Operate from strategic bases Northfleet and Tonbridge.

Borderless concept on a placement plan.

Immediate call – Prompt attendance, safe.

High call – Within the hour.

Default patrol tasking as directed by District Neighbourhood

Response officers provide a 'golden hour' response before handing over to the Neighbourhood Teams.

24 hour response, well equipped and well trained.

Most appropriate!



Crime Investigation

The new model has introduced two distinct units for each division; both a proactive and a reactive investigation team.

• Proactive Investigation

Target offenders in a bid to reduce crime and offending as well as investigate crime series. Provide a prisoner handling function on behalf of the Response and Neighbourhood Team as appropriate.

• Reactive Investigation

Investigate serious crimes attended by both Response and Neighbourhood Officers. Provide a prisoner handling function on behalf of the Response Team as appropriate.

Neighbourhood Policing

Neighbourhood Teams have increased significantly under the new model with the number of constables being increased and the adoption of an extended working day from 7am until 3am.

The shift pattern reflects demand, resulting in officers being available when required. Neighbourhood officers attend all incidents of anti-social behaviour (ASB), incidents not requiring an immediate response and reported crime within their district.

Officers also carry out targeted patrols and police the night time economy. Officers record and investigate the majority of crime reports they attend; crime outside of their remit is then passed to detectives within the Crime Investigation Units.

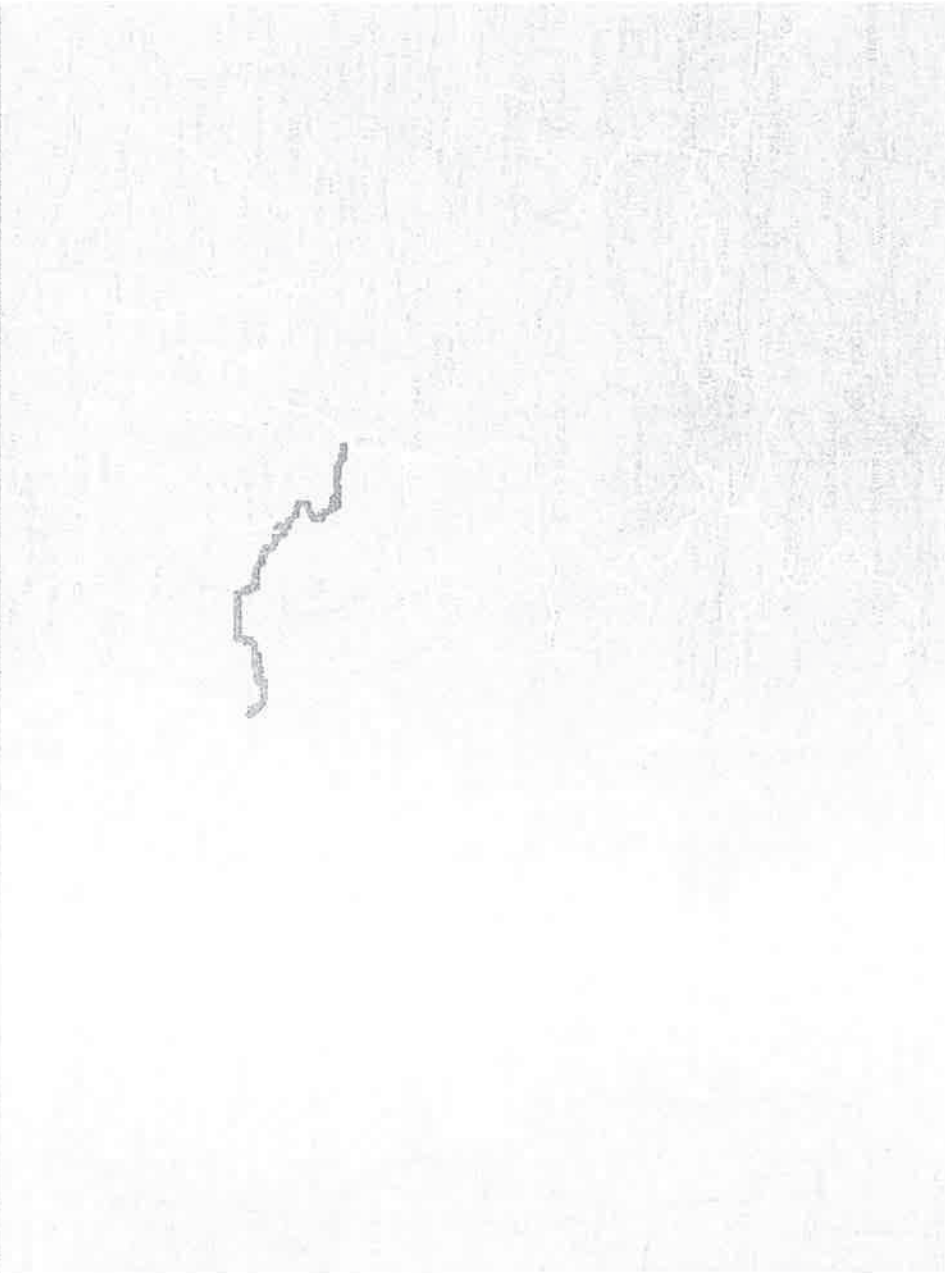
Police Community Support Officers are the front line response to ASB, Problem solving and community engagement.

District policing is supported by Community Safety Unit, co located partnership Police, SDC, Environmental Health, WKHousing, Sevenoaks Dst Council.
