- 4 Description of Project: Riverhead Parish Council own 8 acres of Parkland between Britains Lane and Riverhead Infants School, with an entrance as well from St Marys Drive. With the heavy rains and snow, the St Marys Drive entrance has turned into a quagmire, making it impossible to push prams through it, nor can children walk to school easily on their way to Riverhead Infants School or Amherst School. The project involved laying a granite geo-textile membrane 3-8 meters wide, 100gms thick, for about 100 meters, to make it walkable.

- 5 Total project cost: £6,500 + VAT. As a parish council we have our VAT reimbursed by HMRC.

How will the money be spent?

We will have to bring a small digger in and scrape off all the mud. Then we will lay a base for the granite to provide a solid foundation. A geotextile membrane and peeps and a sub-base. Our budget is determined by WOODSTONE LANDSCAPING estimate 161113. Our Parkland Budget is fully spent this financial year, but we can switch £30,208 from earnings from village hall to this project. If the total cost exceeds the amount requested from Big Community Fund, please state here how the remaining cost is to be met:

The remaining cost of £32,000 will be met from our Parkland Budget, which comes from our £48,000 precept. We have a Parkland Committee, with total Budget for the Parkland of £5,500 per annum. This can be topped up if necessary from £50,000 reserves. Amount requested from the SDC Big Community fund: should our village hall lets not realise enough.

£ 3,000. We would like to start the project late February, Early March if we receive the grant.

- 6 Your community

How have you been able to involve the local community in planning this project?

Yes, see email from Mike Kerlogue of St Mary Drive. Several women have complained to us about not being able to push buggies through mud when taking their children to school. Parents of children and dog walkers have also complained to us.

7 What is the need for the project? *Riverhead has in the past had a walking school bus from Hamster carpark to Riverhead Infants School and Amherst School, going through the park at St Mary Drive entrance. We also host a breakfast club in our village 730-820 AM, which walks about 15 children through our Parkland via St Mary Drive. Many parents with children do so*

8 Long term benefits *as well, and many dog walkers use this entrance. We have volunteer Parkland Workparties 1 morning a month which ensure the project continues to benefit people.*

Please comment on the lasting effects of the project: *St Marys Drive entrance will become an all weather facility, will greatly improve accessibility to our Parkland, and school children will use it without becoming muddy.*

9 The impact of your project

How will you know whether the project has been a success? *We will stop getting continuous complaints from parents and other local users, and more children will use the Parkland to get to school avoiding the busy and dangerous A25.*

10 Ongoing costs


If there is an on-going need for maintenance or management of the project, who will be responsible and how will this be funded?


Any long term maintenance will be met by Riverhead Parish Council Parkland Committee from their budget. The contractors who have given us estimates say the granite will last a least 10 years, and probably much longer.



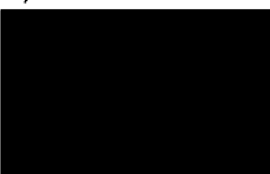

6 Your community

How have you been able to involve the local community in planning this project?

The matter was raised at a recent public parish Council meeting and received full support. The Village Hall Management Committee looked at providing their own inside the hall and could not afford it. The hall is used all day, 6 days a week by the public. This unit for use by the public would cover all that. There are 1327 electors on list and it would cover the majority of these, plus all the children, plus those from the primary school and users of the hall. It is planned to train 10 local people who will be able to use the apparatus. Their skills will be useful in other situations.

7 What is the need for the project?

There is no local doctors surgery in the village - the nearest being in Swanley. Times for ambulances are also often outside the critical 8-10 minutes to relieve somebody. The Village Hall where it is to be erected is very central and would cover a wide area and a great number of residents - including the primary school. The village hall and school are visited by vulnerable people. Having a defibrillator would provide a good safety measure.

8 Long term benefits

Please comment on the lasting effects of the project:

Provision of this unit will help all areas of the community and give people peace of mind and reassurance. It will be available via a call to the ambulance service 24hrs a day, 7 days a week. They will provide the code to unlock the cabinet. As it will be kept in a locked cabinet it should be more vandal proof.

9 The impact of your project

How will you know whether the project has been a success?

- (i) Obviously it only needs to save one life.
- (ii) 10 local people are trained in the use of the defibrillator.

10 Ongoing costs

If there is an on-going need for maintenance or management of the project, who will be responsible and how will this be funded?

There are very little ongoing costs and maintenance. A new battery required once every 4 years. All costs will be funded by parish Council.

11. Supporting statement from the sponsoring Local Member:

The need for a defibrillator has been identified by the local community. The village has no surgery or trained medical staff available. Some years ago a young child died at a local shop from choking. The provision of a defibrillator would provide reassurance to the local community which is increasingly elderly + more vulnerable.

The plan is to maintain the apparatus at the village hall on the outside wall and on dialling 999 anyone can be talked through the process though time would be available to obtain one of the trained local people. Ambulances can take a while to get to the village + it is felt the defibrillator will help in an emergency. I support the local community seeking to help itself in this way.

4 Description of Project:

Background:

- The recreation ground in Weald Village is maintained by Weald Parish Council and plays host to village based Adult Football, Adult Cricket and Junior Football Clubs.
- The Weald Wolves Club use part of the cricket field for mini-football and training.
- The Adult football pitch is prone to frequent water-logging and the adult football matches get the priority usage on this pitch. Consequently, the U14's junior players get very limited opportunities to play competitive football in their home village.
- Weald Wolves will risk folding if enduring facilities for junior footballers, particularly U14+, are not provided as the players will simply move onto other clubs with better facilities and where they are more likely to get to play a competitive game.
- Were this to happen, it would be a major loss to the young people of Weald village, as they would lose their opportunity to achieve/maintain fitness, play football and all the other benefits of team sports, currently available to them on their doorstep.

Aim: To ensure that Weald Wolves Junior Football Club will have the facilities to play Junior competitive football in Weald Village.

Solution:

After consultation with the Weald Recreation Ground Association and the Adult Football Club, it was agreed that the site of the original Adult Football pitch, sharing the cricket outfield, should be re-established. The major capital items are new removable goal posts adhering to Health & Safety equipment standards.

Project Deliverables:

- A seasonally equipped Junior (U14+) sized Football pitch on Weald Recreation Ground, (sharing the adult cricket pitch outfield, out of the cricket season, i.e. Autumn, Winter & Spring)
- Marked and lined junior football pitch.
- Procured "park quality" removable goal-posts and ground sockets.
- Installed ground sockets to allow little disruption to co-users of the ground off-season plus added security against theft of the posts.

6 Your community

How have you been able to involve the local community in planning this project?

The challenge of where the U14's could play in Weald village was discussed with representatives of the village's Adult Football and Cricket Clubs, the Weald Recreation Committee and of course the Weald Junior Football Club. It was agreed the junior players should be allowed and able to play in their village as the travelling costs and costs to hire external pitches was not sustainable and detrimental to the viability of the Weald Wolves Club in the long term.

The Adult Football Club agreed that the U14's can use the adult pitch on an exceptional basis only, as the drainage is so poor and the pitch struggles to support its two adult teams. The solution to re-establish the old adult pitch that lay across the cricket field was proposed at the meeting.

The cost to kit out this new pitch with posts was presented to Weald Parish Council and a request was made to secure PC money to help fund the project. The PC agreed to provide £200 towards the project and Cllr. Thornton suggested that this project was an ideal candidate for the SDC Big Community Fund scheme.

"Weald Wolves has been a real success story for the children and youth of Weald Village. The number of local children and parents training and playing football on the Weald Recreation Ground on a Saturday morning is real testament to its demand from the local children and parents. As Chairman of the Recreation Ground I fully support this project to extend the facilities and allow the children to play true home games. The cost to benefit ratio to the children, Clubs and Weald Community is very favourable."

It is very important to establish a sense of pride in their Club and having their own basic facilities such as a pitch with new goal posts will go a long way to promote the children's sense of belonging.
I also see the weekly frustration and lack of understanding from the children and their parents when they are told we have to travel so far to local games. This is a relatively low cost investment but will mean so much to the Wolves players and coaches and will be a real win for the Community and most importantly the children."

7 What is the need for the project?

Weald Wolves was formed in 2000 by local parents and this has grown into an FA affiliated Junior Football Club with over sixty players aged from U5 to U15's with eight active local parent coaches and committee members.

Weald Junior Football Club does not have access to a large football pitch in Weald Village. The Club, coaches, children and parents are incurring additional expenditure to hire football pitches for U14's games and travelling time/distances of up to 12 miles and half an hour to play "home" games.

The lack of football pitch facilities in the village is not sustainable for the Wolves Club and risks the junior football activities ceasing at 13 years old which in turn risk the long term legacy and viability of the Junior Football Club.

The second pitch would also mean the adult teams have a contingency pitch as the drainage of the old original pitch is believed to be superior.

8 Long term benefits

Please comment on the lasting effects of the project:

Weald Wolves players will have a true "home" pitch. This is important to their sporting motivation and building their allegiance to their Club, their home village and their community.

At an age when computers and television provides a real pull to stay indoors, sport for

young teenagers is of vital importance. The Parents Charter for Kent County Council supports parents in encouraging their children to be well, fit and active. The new goal posts will break down any potential barriers to be part of the U14 team, and ensure that sport continues to be a focus for these young teenagers.

Weald Wolves Junior Football club is far more likely to go forward if the juniors have a "home" ground in the village, the club will bear lower running costs, the coaches will have less hassle organising alternative arrangements and the parents will be more likely to support their local community team through spectating and getting involved in the Club.

Weald Village will benefit as a whole by having a second full size pitch to add to its limited sporting assets – therefore opportunities for raising supplementary income from hiring out this new pitch to fund the general upkeep of the ground will increase.

9 The impact of your project

How will you know whether the project has been a success?

The success of the project will be measured as follows:

1. Weald Recreation Ground will increase its football facilities by 100% to two usable U14+/Adult sized football pitches. The new pitch will not only allow the U14+ to play home matches but will also provide a contingency pitch for the Weald Adult football team to play on should the existing Adult pitch be water logged (a regular occurrence)
2. The number of home games played by U14 team will increase from less than five to approximately twenty per average season, although in future season this could rise to 50+ games if U15s and U16s teams can be established once a home pitch has been secured
3. The number of games abandoned due to water logged pitches (for both the Junior and Adult Football clubs) will dramatically reduce (currently up to 24 potential games for adults and children are not playable between November and February)
4. Membership levels in the U14+ section of the club will improve if the club have proper home pitches we would expect to have ten more players at these ages join over the next two or three years. Conversely, without these basic facilities, the club will cease to exist for over fourteen year olds as they will choose to migrate to other clubs out of the area (this would affect up to 40 of the current players population as they age beyond the U14 ceiling over the next three years).

10 Ongoing costs

If there is an on-going need for maintenance or management of the project, who will be responsible and how will this be funded?

There are no specific on-going maintenance or management costs for this particular project.

The on-going general up-keep of the new re-established pitch along with all grassed areas and Recreation Ground buildings and boundaries will continue to be the responsibility of the Weald Parish Council; the clubs maintain line marking etc.

The Goal nets will be perishable and need replacing over time but local fundraising and or Club membership income will cover these replacements.

The posts will be taken down at the end of each season and stored in the secure equipment container on the Recreation Ground to prolong the life and security of the posts.

11 Supporting statement from the sponsoring Local Member:

I am delighted to have finally found a worthy and eligible project within Weald village to put forward to the Big Community Fund, as the two previous applications that I have sponsored have benefitted projects in the Seal Parish part of my ward.

I am especially pleased that this project will benefit the youth of the village and in particular young teenagers, at a time in their life when organised sport tends to start losing its appeal. And what better way to keep the Olympic legacy alive than to provide a whole new sporting facility in this relatively small community?

Weald Wolves are a vibrant and proactive club. They are passionate about their cause and the organisers and coaches invest a huge amount of voluntary time to ensure the smooth running of the club. Whilst they have a sizable membership for a village club, the subs they need to charge to just meet their running costs (including recognised external training for their volunteer coaches) are already quite steep and they hold virtually no reserves, apart from cash from their subs to meet costs during the current season. As such, they are not in a financial position to be able to find the money for these new goal posts themselves, but as you can see they are more than happy to put their own time and efforts into doing all they can to get these new goal posts up and ready for action as soon as possible.

I am also keen to support the cross community approach that they have taken on this project to find a solution to their dilemma. As you have seen in this application form, they have negotiated a solution with the other users of the Recreation Ground and have also got the buy-in – and some financial support – from the Parish Council. I was also pleased to see that other community groups were prepared to add their supporting statements to this application (see the last part of section 6).

I have been assured by Mr Venables that the Club will widely publicise any funding that they do secure from the Big Community fund. They propose to hold an opening BBQ for first game held on the new pitch to which they will invite key local and village stakeholders, club members, parents and other local clubs. They will also promote around village via the Parish newsletter, via their own website, to club members via email and via the Weald Community News section in the Sevenoaks Chronicle. They also intend to encourage The Chronicle to cover this good news story as a main editorial item and link it in with a plea for more players and coaches and to cover their forthcoming games to be held at West Ham stadium.

Mr Venables has done an excellent job in providing the detailed content for this application form, so I trust that you have all the information that you require in order to make your decision. But please do feel free to contact me with any questions that you may still have prior to the meeting. I believe this project should score highly against the BCF judging criteria and I sincerely hope that you will be as convinced as I am that they are worthy of receiving the full amount of funding that they are requesting from the fund.


