1 <u>KENT HIGHWAY SERVICES SOFT ESTATE MAINTENANCE 2011/12 - UPDATE</u>

Summary

An update on planned levels of service for soft estate maintenance of the highway during 2011/12

1.1 Introduction

1.1.1 Kent Highway Services carries out programmed highway vegetation maintenance throughout the county. The works to grass verges, shrub beds and hedges, as well as weed control on hard surfaces, are currently carried out by contractors or other councils on our behalf.

1.2 The Funding Context

- 1.2.1 The KHS soft estate budget was reduced by 30% for the financial year 2011/12 compared to that of the previous year. As a result savings of £1.5M had to be made to the soft estate maintenance budget. The only way to achieve these savings was to reduce the service.
- 1.2.2 In order to remain within the available budgets in 2011/12 the service will be delivered as follows: -
 - 8 urban grass cuts
 - 1 rural swathe cut
 - 2-3 visibility cuts
 - 1 visit to shrub beds to weed and cut back
 - 1 weed spray
 - 1 hedge cut

1.2.3 Reimbursements to district councils who carry out work on our behalf will be benchmarked using the above frequencies. Please note some districts may carry out extra operations at their own expense.

1.3 Legal Implications

1.3.1 None applicable.

1.4 Financial and Value for Money Considerations

1.4.1 No direct financial considerations for the Borough Council and, for the County Council, as described above.

1.5 Risk Assessment

1.5.1 The inevitable risk is an increase in public concern about the state of the highway as a result of service level reductions.

Winter Damage Repairs – Find & Fix and Surfacing Schemes

Executive Summary: Following the winter of 2010/11 and the subsequent damage to the highway network across the country, the Government allocated additional funding to local authorities to carry out repairs. Kent County Council was allocated £6.5 million. This was divided up for each district and this report sets out how this money is being spent in Sevenoaks.

1. Introduction.

As a result of the severe winter of 2010/11 the Government provided Kent County Council with a settlement of £6.5 million. £2 million has been allocated to a find and fix programme for carriageway pothole repairs and £4.5 million for surface treatments across the county.

2. Find and Fix.

- 2.1 Over £220,000 will be spent in Sevenoaks as part of this programme which commenced in May 2011 following the award of contract to Mason Civil Engineering Contractors. The operation is similar to last year where by external contractors are employed to permanently repair potholes and carry out patching works in nominated roads on the minor network.
- 2.2 With the programme this year we have given greater responsibility to the local teams for identification and prioritising works. This has enabled the teams to target specific areas and drive productivity. Auditing of these works has been undertaken on a regular basis by KHS staff.
- 2.3 During the Period from 1st May until the end of August, 63 roads were identified for repairs with 10,110 m2 of patching completed. The completed locations are listed below for the Boards information. (Please note: These are just the roads completed using this contractor. In addition a large number of

other roads were repaired by the existing Term Maintenance Contractor – Ringway).

Introduction

1. This report is an update on that made to previous meetings of the board and summarises the identified schemes that have been programmed for construction by Kent Highway Services 2011/12.

2. Gully Cleansing Schedules

From the 1st September 2011 a more programmed approach to gully cleansing will be adopted. The level of resource dedicated to cleansing will remain the same however this change will enable Kent Highways to maximise efficiency, gain best value from the new contractual arrangement with Enterprise Plc and ensure that the entire network is being maintained on a regular basis. Cleansing schedules will be developed on monthly basis with a view to incorporating as many enquiry locations (i.e. locations where blocked gullies have been reported) as is feasible and will then be made available the members of the public via kent.gov.uk.

Whilst undertaking gully cleansing activities, crews will record defects such as broken covers or blockages and these will then be investigated and auctioned by the engineers in the Drainage Team. The crews will also be collecting information such as location, size and silt levels prior to cleansing each individual gully. This data will enable Kent Highways to develop and improve our planning of gully maintenance and move towards a needs based approach to cleansing in the future.

In addition to a programme of drainage repairs and improvements, the following schemes are currently in progress:

Summary: This report is to inform this Committee of the authorisation to

adopt formal powers to enforce double parking and parking at dropped kerbs and to gain support from the Committee to give written approval to the 12 district authorities to commence the enforcement of double parking and at dropped kerbs for

community use.

1. Introduction

1.1 Within Kent, the 12 District/Borough and City Councils are responsible for the practical application of parking policy and enforcement under 12 individual Agency Agreements.

2. Background Information

2.1 Changes to legislation, brought about by the introduction of the Traffic Management Act 2004 give powers to the appropriate authority to issue a penalty charge notice to any vehicle double parked or parked adjacent to a dropped kerb. The current agency agreements between Kent County Council and the 12 district authorities require KCC to give written permission to the district authorities prior to their commencing these powers.

3. Proposed use of new powers

- 3.1 There are three main aspects to the new powers.
- 3.1.1 Parking adjacent to a dropped kerb at a crossing point (Dropped Kerbs for Community Use which are usually identified by the use of tactile paving):

 Such parking causes inconvenience for people trying to cross the road, in particular those pushing prams or using wheelchairs or mobility vehicles. It is recommended that Civil Enforcement Officers (CEO) issue a penalty charge notice (PCN) whenever they have reason to believe that this contravention is taking place.
- 3.1.2 Double parking defined as parking 50cm or more from the kerb:

 Double parking contributes toward congestion and inconvenience for other road users. It is recommended that CEO's issue a PCN whenever they have reason to believe that this contravention is taking place.

Supplementary Information

3.1.3 Parking adjacent to a dropped kerb outside residential premises:

It is recommended that CEO's do not issue PCN's in these locations as the legislation explicitly allows vehicles to be parked in these circumstances by or

with the consent of the occupier, unless it is a shared driveway. The enforcement of private dropped kerbs may lead to a public expectation of a 24 hour enforcement regime and the subsequent removal of vehicles which cannot be achieved under the current enforcement processes.

3.2 It should be noted that the prohibition of parking at a dropped kerb at a crossing point includes where a footway, cycle track or verge has been lowered to meet the level of the carriageway; and it applies equally where the carriageway has been raised to the level of the footway, cycle track or verge.

4. Financial Implications

- 4.1 Additional CEO's will not be employed to undertake this enforcement and it will be carried out as part of normal day to day enforcement. There is therefore no additional cost in staff time. There may be a limited additional income through the issuing of PCN's but it is to be noted that parking enforcement is a necessary tool to ensure good traffic management and road safety, not to generate an income stream.
- 4.2 The penalty charge for these offences is set at £70, which is discounted by 50% if paid within fourteen days.

5. Equalities Implications

Enforcement of double parking and parking at dropped kerbs will assist those with visual or mobility impairment as this enforcement action will aim to remove inconsiderate parking to allow ease of access.

6. Recommendation

The Committee is asked to note that new powers to undertake civil parking enforcement at dropped kerbs and for double parking are formally adopted by Kent County Council. And that we give permission to the 12 district authorities to evoke parking contraventions in relation to vehicles parked adjacent to dropped kerbs with the exception of private driveways.

RE: PERMISSION TO ENFORCE DROPPED KERBS AND DOUBLE PARKING

Further to our previous discussions and e mail correspondence, I am writing with regard to the permission to enforce dropped kerbs and double parking under the decriminalised parking agreement.

Kent County Council grant each individual authority the permission to enforce the following:

Dropped Kerbs – District authorities are given overall permission to enforce any vehicles parking adjacent to a dropped kerb with the exception of dropped kerbs serving private residential driveways.

Double Parking – District authorities are given overall permission to enforce any vehicle parking more than 50cm from the kerbline (double parking)

I enclose copies of the advisory leaflets for your use prior to the commencement of full enforcement.

I would also request that each individual authority notify their JTB of their intention to commence enforcement and I would be grateful if you could notify me of your intended date of commencement.




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DON'T PARK ACROSS A DROPPED KERB

You may not have realised it but it's actually a parking contravention to block or park across a dropped kerb.



From 1st December 2011 Sevenoaks District Council will be issuing penalty charge notices to vehicles parked partly or completely over a dropped kerb in use by the local community, as provided under the Traffic Management Act 2004. This action will not be taken at residential properties as it is the job of your local police force to enforce this as obstruction under their powers.

What is a dropped kerb?

Dropped kerbs are where the kerb stone has been lowered to make a gentle ramp for pedestrians, pushchairs, wheelchairs or vehicles. They can be across the pavement, grass verge or cycle track and many of them are indicated by tactile paving.

Why is parking not permitted?



Dropped kerbs are there to assist those who need to cross the road safely or for vehicle access. Blocking this access causes obstruction and is a nuisance for other road users. Both the Traffic Management Act 2004 and the Highway Code state that a driver must not park or wait where a kerb has been lowered.

I am a Blue Badge holder, does this apply to me?

Yes, the Blue Badge is not a licence to park anywhere and no-one should leave a vehicle where it will cause an obstruction. Dropped kerbs are often installed to assist access for pedestrians who have restricted mobility.

How much is the penalty?

Penalties are currently set at £70 although a discount period applies reducing the sum to £35 for 14 days.


DON'T DOUBLE PARK


You may not realise it but it is actually a contravention to double park (park more than 50cm from the edge of the pavement, kerbline or edge of the road.)

From 1st December 2011 Sevenoaks District Council will be issuing penalty charge notices to vehicles parked more than 50cm from the edge of the kerbline, as provided under the Traffic Management Act 2004.

What is double parking?

Double Parking applies when a vehicle is parked on any part of the carriageway (road) and no part of the vehicle is within 50cm of the edge of the carriageway (kerbline) unless the vehicle is wholly within a marked parking bay.







How much is the penalty?

Penalties are currently set at £70 although a discount period applies reducing the sum to £35 for 14 days.

Executive Summary: Following receipt of permission from Kent County Council to enforce new parking contraventions brought in under the Traffic Management Act 2004, this report advises Members of the District Council's intentions to commence enforcement of parking across a dropped kerb and double parking.

This report supports the Key Aim of safer communities and the effective and efficient use of resources.

Recommendation: Members are asked to note the report.

Introduction

The introduction of Part 6 of the Traffic Management Act 2004 in 2008 included the provision new parking contraventions for double parking and parking at dropped kerbs.

- The report by Kent County Council's Parking Manager to the County Council's Environment, Highways and Waste Policy Review and Scrutiny Committee on 18 January 2011, attached as Appendix A, gives background information.
- The Review and Scrutiny Committee approved that the new powers to undertake civil parking enforcement at dropped kerbs (with the exception of private driveways) and for double parking to be formally adopted by Kent County Council.
- On 1st August 2011, Kent County Council formally notified District authorities that permission had been granted to enforce the new contraventions with the exception of dropped kerbs serving private residential driveways. The notification letter from the Kent Parking Manager is attached as Appendix B.
- Accordingly, the District Council now intends to commence the enforcement of these new contraventions.

Publicity

- There is an expectation that any authority commencing enforcement of these contraventions will first publicise their intentions in order to make the general public fully aware. We shall, therefore, be including information in the Council's next In-Shape publication which is delivered to every household in the District. This will be towards the end of November.
- 7 Notification will also be given in the local newspapers.
- Leaflets explaining the new contraventions have been produced in conjunction with Kent County Council and other Kent Districts and will be made available on the Council's website and at the offices. These are attached as Appendix C.

Enforcement

- We propose to start enforcement at the beginning of December. Initially, for the first 14 days, any vehicle found not complying with these contraventions will not be issued with a penalty charge notice but, instead, one of the leaflets will be left to inform drivers about the new contraventions.
- The inclusion of these new contraventions will enhance the Council's ability to deal with obstructive parking throughout the District.

Key Implications - Financial

11 There are no notable financial implications.

Community impact and outcomes

The ability to enforce these contraventions should reduce obstructions at footway crossing points and, hence, will assist pedestrian access particularly for people with mobility issues, and should help reduce traffic delays resulting from double parking, to the benefit of the local community and other road users.

CHARGING REGIME FOR THE PROVISION OF ON-STREET DISABLED PARKING PLACES

Executive Summary: This report requests that Members confirm whether a charge should be made for the provision of on-street disabled parking places, taking into account Kent County Council's legal advice.

Recommendation: It be RESOLVED that:

- (a) the implementation of interim disabled parking places be at no cost to applicants and that they be funded from the on-street parking account, and that either
- (b) the provision of enforceable on-street disabled parking places requiring a traffic regulation order be at no cost to applicants and funded from the on-street parking account, or
- (c) that a charge be made for the provision of enforceable on-street disabled parking places requiring a traffic regulation order and that the level of charge be confirmed up to the maximum level of £250 recommended by Kent County Council.

Introduction

1. Following a lengthy review of the application procedures for providing disabled persons' parking bays, Kent County Council (KCC) has decided not to set a formal policy document on this matter.

- 2. However, representatives of the Kent District Engineers' Group have agreed that new procedures proposed by KCC should be adopted but that a decision on whether or not to charge for bays should be made by each individual District or Borough.
- 3. This report therefore seeks a decision on whether a charge should be made for providing disabled parking bays and, if so, the amount to be charged.

Background Information

- 4. An overhaul of the application procedure for providing disabled persons' parking bays has been necessary following legal advice concerning disability discrimination. These issues have been addressed with the new application procedures proposed by KCC (Appendix A). However, following independent legal advice regarding charging, the decision on whether to charge and if so, the amount to charge is to be made at District level.
- 5. Historically, an agreement between KCC and District and Borough Councils in 2001 stated an administration charge of £30 could be charged for the consideration of disabled parking bay applications. It was thought that the levying of a fee would discourage unwarranted applications. However, the actual costs involved in administering the application and implementing the bay is far greater than £30. Sevenoaks District Council applied the charge until we received notification of KCC's legal advice with regard to disability discrimination. Following that advice, no charge has been made for administering applications.
- 6. As stated, Sevenoaks District Council previously charged applicants £30 to cover administration costs (whether or not the application was successful) to cover the costs associated with processing the application and site visits, etc. This was considered a small amount compared to the actual costs involved and most applicants were happy to pay this. However, because they had paid, many applicants then believed they had exclusive rights to the bay, despite the fact that it was clearly stated otherwise. Once provided, disabled parking bays are available for use by any Blue Badge holder.
- 7. Following confirmation from KCC that disabled parking bays could be provided on an 'advisory' basis without a Traffic Regulation Order (TRO), successful applications processed from January 2009 have been provided with an interim bay. These bays have the advantage of being provided much quicker and for less cost, but with the disadvantage that they cannot be legally enforced.
- 8. No charge has been made for interim bays due to the advice from KCC and because the full cost for making a TRO has not been incurred.
- 9. Typically between 15 and 20 applications are received each year. As yet, there have been no enforcement issues concerning the interim bays that are currently in place and, hence, no requests to convert interim bays into enforceable bays have been received.

Kent County Council Recommendation

- 10. The legal advice received from KCC is that the £30 administration fee that was charged previously is no longer considered to be a legal option for an authority. However, there is a statutory power within Section 111 of the Local Government Act 1972 that will allow for charging of the actual provision of parking bays. This should be distinguished from pre-application administration which is not a statutory process.
- 11. KCC have recommended that although a charge may be made to the customer to pay for any necessary signs, lines and TRO, this should be capped at £250 per application.

Costs Involved

- 12. The provision of a permanent disabled bay with a valid Traffic Regulation Order is expensive, both in staff time and public consultations the majority of that cost normally being the advertising costs of the TRO. Although the District Council presently has favourable terms for the placement of public advertisements, should these terms end, the cost of advertising a TRO is likely to be circa £1,000. However, it is likely that advertisements in respect to disabled bays would be tied in with those for other TRO proposals wherever possible.
- 13. The cost of marking a bay is currently £40 £80 (depending on circumstances and weather) and the costs for providing/erecting a sign is approximately £120.
- 14. Additionally, there are the administration/engineer's costs in processing the application, undertaking consultation and preparing the TRO. Typically, these can be between £100 and £200.
- 15. The provision of an interim bay involves only the administration/engineer's costs required to process the application and the cost of marking the bay. No TRO is required and therefore no sign or street furniture is necessary.

Conclusions and Observations

- 16. Although a charge may deter unwarranted requests, the new application procedure clearly defines the criteria for providing a bay and therefore a charge should not be considered for this reason.
- 17. Many applicants, particularly those who are retired or unable to work, may not be financially able to meet a significant charge for a bay. Should a decision be made to charge, the applicant's likely ability to pay should be taken into account.
- 18. Should an applicant request that an interim bay be made permanent, a Traffic Regulation Order is required and an additional amount could then be justified. However, applicants will undoubtedly (but incorrectly) still expect to have

exclusive rights to park in a bay to which they have contributed. Consideration of the applicant's ability to pay would still apply.

Recommendations

- 19. In respect to interim bays, and subject to the views of the Cabinet, it is recommended that no charge be made. The minimal costs associated with the lining work can usually be programmed with other works in the area so economies of scale can apply.
- 20. In respect to permanent bays, it is also recommended that no charge be made as this would seem to be against the ethos of providing a facility for those in need, especially as they have already had to prove that they are in receipt of allowances (e.g. the higher rate of disability living allowance or the higher rate of attendance allowance) as part of the qualification process.
- 21. However, should it be decided that a charge be made, it should be within the recommended maximum of £250 suggested by Kent County Council. However, it should be borne in mind that should a charge be made, it would be more likely that applicants' expectations would need to be carefully managed, as experience shows an applicant would expect exclusive rights to park in the bay (even when advised this is not the case) thus increasing the potential for conflict with other blue badge holders.
- 22. Should it be decided not to charge and, at some stage in the future, there is found to be a significant increase in the number of requests for permanent bays, Members may then wish to reconsider whether the policy should be amended and a charge made. The matter could then be reported back to this Committee for further consideration.

Key Implications – Financial

- 23. The number of bays that would be provided as 'legally enforceable' and requiring a TRO are expected to be very low possibly one or two applications per year. At present the costs associated with this are absorbed within the on-street parking account, as the works are programmed alongside other necessary tasks.
- 24. Although the introduction of a charge would recover the current costs involved, it would not cover the higher advertising costs (even at the highest 'capped' level) should the favourable arrangements in the local papers come to an end.

Community impact and outcomes

25. The introduction of charges at a higher level than those that previously applied for administration purposes are likely to disadvantage those members of the community who are already in receipt of allowances. This could act as a deterrent to applications and reduce mobility and social inclusion for vulnerable members of the community.

Legal, Human Rights, etc.

26. The District Council has a requirement to adhere to the terms of the Disabilities Discrimination Act and all other appropriate legislation, and must also be aware of the legal counsel received by Kent County Council.

Risk Assessment Statement

27. There are no risks associated with the setting of a charge or the level of that charge, provided this is made in relation to the provision of a bay and not in relation to the administration of applications, taking into account legal advice obtained by Kent County Council.
