The interested party will not, therefore be "a party to the hearing" (Reg. 2 Hearings Regulations). There will therefore be no right to address the hearing (Reg. 16 Hearings Regulations).

The above also applies to a Member i.e. if s/he does not make a "relevant representation" s/he will not be a "party to the hearing" and has no right to address the hearing unless appointed by "a party to the hearing" to assist or represent that party".

- 1. Procedure at Sub-Committees of the Licensing Committee (established in accordance with Section 9 of the Licensing Act 2003)
- 1.1 In accordance with Section 9 (1) of the Licensing Act 2003, the Licensing Committee has resolved to establish five Sub-Committees, each consisting of three members of the Committee.
- 1.2 The Sub-Committees have delegated authority to determine those functions that are reserved for decision by the Sub-Committees in accordance with Appendix B of the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy dated 7 January 2011.
- 1.3 Hearings shall be conducted in accordance with this Procedure Note and The Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005 subject to the right of the Sub-Committee to vary that procedure at their absolute discretion if considered in the public interest.
- 1.4 The quorum for a Sub-Committee shall be two members.
- 1.5 At the commencement of each hearing the Sub-Committee shall elect one of its members as Chairman.
- 1.6 The order of business at hearings shall be:
  - (a) Election of Chairman.
  - (b) Declarations of interests.

(c) Chairman explains the procedure to be followed at the hearing, including the setting of equal time limits for all parties and the granting of adjournments.

- (d) Chairman ascertains who is assisting or representing the parties.
- (e) Applicant (or his/her representative) addresses the Sub-Committee.

(f) Applicant questioned by members. At the discretion of the Sub-Committee, other parties may be permitted to question the applicant.

(g) Persons who have made representations in respect of the application (or their representative) address the Sub-Committee. No issues other than those relevant to their representations may be raised.

(h) Members question each party at the conclusion of their address. At the discretion of the Sub-Committee, the applicant may be permitted to question other parties.

(i) Sub-Committee may offer the parties a short adjournment to discuss in the absence of the Sub-Committee whether a solution acceptable to all the parties can be put to the Sub-Committee.

(j) Applicant (or his/her representative) makes closing address.

(k) Sub-Committee may grant a short adjournment. The parties may not speak to members regarding the application during adjournments.

(I) The Sub-Committee considers the application and motions put to accept or reject the application in the terms requested or to grant the application subject to specified conditions. Reasons are to be given for motions.

(m) The parties will be informed of the decision at the hearing or thereafter in accordance with Regulation 26 of the 2005 Regulation.

#### Background

The procedure for Hearings of Sub-Committees of the Licensing Committee established in accordance with Section 9 of the Licensing Act 2003 is attached to the agenda.

The application is made by Mr Mahathnaseelan Puthuvlakan of 14A Eagle Road, Wembley. HAO 4SH to allow the sale of alcohol at the convenience store.

#### The application is to:

Section M	To allow sale of alcohol for consumption off the premises on Monday to Thursday from 06:00 until 23:30 hours, Friday and Saturday from 06:00 until 00:00 hours and on Sunday from 08:00 until 22:30 hours.
Section O	Hours premises are open to the public are Monday to Thursday from 06:00 until 23:30 hours, Friday and Saturday from 06:00 until 00:00 hours and on Sunday from 08:00 until 22:30 hours.

The applicant intends to take the following action in order to promote the four licensing objectives if the proposed application is granted:

#### General

Strict implementation of Challenge 25 policy. Separating alcohol from children's section. All staff to be trained in responsible alcohol retailing. CCTV in operation 24 hours. Recording and monthly storing system. Joining Retailwatch schemes and keeping in touch with the police.

#### The Prevention of Crime and Disorder

Train all staff and develop the right atmosphere with customers. CCTV installed inside and outside. Join Retailwatch schemes. Keep a close watch on all customers and keep clear view of premise. Liaise with local police. Be calm and decisive and do not react to provocation. All purchases made from wholesalers/cash and carry's only.

#### **Public Safety**

Installation of appropriate and adequate safety equipment. Installation of emergency lighting and evacuation procedures be in place with warning signs. Fire evacuation procedures to comply with all current fire and health and safety legislation as required by the law. All purchases to be made from wholesalers/cash and carry's only.

#### The Prevention of Public Nuisance

A management policy in place to take into account the external areas of the premises and the conduct of the customers. Notice to customers regarding consideration for neighbours. To monitor anti-social behaviour by use of CCTV. Join Retailwatch schemes. Strict policy not to serve drunken customers. Challenge 25 in force at all times.

#### The Protection of Children from Harm

Strict implementation of Challenge 25 policy. Alcohol to be kept away from children's confectionery shelves. Signs to be put on shelves regards to No ID No Sale on alcohol shelves. Cigarettes and spirits to be kept behind the counter away from children. Staff fully trained on No ID No Sale Challenge 25 policy. Health and Safety measures are in place where equipment is of danger to young persons.

#### Conclusions

Without prejudice, the Officer would like to draw to Members attention issues that they may wish to consider:

Mandatory conditions – the following conditions will be added to the premises licence when it is issued.

#### The supply of alcohol

Where a premises licence authorises the supply of alcohol, the licence must include the following conditions:-

No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence -

(a) at a time where there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or

(b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.

Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

The decision is to be made with regard to the Licensing Act 2003, Secretary of State's Guidance issued under Section 182 of the Act and the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy. Where the decision departs from the Policy or Guidance the departure must be directed solely at the attainment of the licensing objectives, and such departure must be supported by clear and cogent reasons.

Regarding the application for a licence to sell alcohol by DAM News & Toys of 4. High Street, Edenbridge.

As you can see from my address, I live at Roman Caust which has a long frontage on the High Street and one end of the building is almost opposite DoM News o Toys.

My objections to a licence to sell alcohol from these premises are as follows:-

() There are already two shops in the High Street and the Co-op Supermarket close beside it, selling alcohol until late in the evening. (2) There are a number of enns, restaurants and clubs in the High Street which are licenced to sell alcohol.

3 The opportunity to key alcohol, for consumption on the premises or to take home, appears to be more than adequate for a place the size of Edenbridge. Agenda Item 3 (1) Shops selling alcohol attract the comment element.

S The police, whose numbers are being reduced, don't need another licenced premise to keep an eye on.

6 With the alarming increase in alcohol induced medical problems, particularly among the younger generation, it seems irresponsible to allers a shop to be licenced to sell it for 171/2 hours each day and 18 hours on Friday and Saturday (D) We already have a problem on many Friday' and Saturday nights (and other days occasionally), when groups of young people are on their way home after the clubs/pubs close. The pavement along side Roman Court seems a good stopping place for them to have a row using the most obscene language, singing and shorting, Ricking empty cans around and throwing empty bottles and cans in our garden. I feel that having a shop open until midnight selling about, just across the road from Roman Coust, will encourage them to hang around for larger and create more disturbance. This would be very unpleasant

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
