Agenda Item 1 Licensing Committee - 2 November 2021

Members considered the report which proposed an increase to Hackney Carriage and Private Hire Licence fees from April 2022. If there were adverse comments received, the fees would come back to a future meeting of the Committee.

It was noted that in the 2020/21 year, a £40,000 loss in taxi income occurred due to a decrease in the number of driver, vehicle and operator applications processed due to Covid-19. Members considered whether they would consider further increasing fees to recover the costs.

Members discussed the proposed fees and further proposed additions to those fees in order to recover costs. It was noted that taxi drivers were likely to have been financially impacted by the Covid-19 pandemic and that the £40,000 loss was due to extraordinary circumstances.

Recommendation to Licensing Committee:

That, having taken into account the responses received (shown in **Appendix A**) the proposed fees and charges listed in **Appendix B** be adopted with effect from 1 April 2022.

Reason for recommendation:

To ensure that the Council complies with its statutory duty and to ensure that the 'taxi licensing' service remains self-financing, in accordance with the Council's Service and Budget Plan.

Introduction and Background

- At the Licensing Committee on 2nd November 2021, members approved the proposed fees (set out in **Appendix B**) for publication, consultation and implementation with effect from 1st April 2022, subject to consideration of any unresolved written objections.
- The proposed fees were advertised and the Authority received 10 responses from individual licence holders, as well as a petition signed by 44 licence holders (set out in **Appendix A**) which include concerns that this is not an appropriate time to increase fees. Therefore, this matter must be considered by the Licensing Committee and a decision be made as to whether to adopt or modify the proposed fees for implementation from 1st April 2021.

- For Members reference, the current 2021/22 fees are attached at **Appendix** C.
- It is brought to the attention of Members that the matter of increasing the Hackney Carriage Tariff (raised in the petition signed by 44 licence holders in **Appendix A**) will be brought for your attention as a separate report.
- 5 The taxi licensing service is required to be self-financing and the proposed increases to fees will ensure this is maintained.
- 6 Careful monitoring of income and expenditure has been carried out over the current financial year and the income from licence fees and associated costs, together with expenditure has been in accordance with the objectives laid out in the budget plan.
- The type of tasks involved in taxi licensing applications include: assistance to applicant, checking of an application upon receipt, processing the application. Once processed, determining the licence or arranging a hearing and holding and attending a hearing, notification of the decision, preparation and issue of the licence, updating records and registers, appeal preparation and appearing at an appeal hearing. The training of Officers and Members has also been included, as well as the cost of consumables.

Key Implications

Financial

The cost of licence fees takes into account the need to maintain a 'self-financing' position for the service. The proposals contained in this report will achieve this.

Legal Implications and Risk Assessment Statement

Should parts of the industry believe the Authority's fees are at a level which is greater than the costs of the statutory function, then it is open to them to undertake a 'judicial review proceeding'. Should this arise, the Authority would need to evidence how it arrived at the fee levels to demonstrate that they have been calculated on a cost recovery basis only.

Equality Assessment

The decisions recommended through this paper have a remote or low relevance to the substance of the Equality Act. There is no perceived impact on end users

Net Zero Implications

The decisions recommended through this paper have a remote or low relevance to the council's ambition to be Net Zero by 2030. There is no perceived impact regarding either an increase or decrease in carbon emissions in the district, or

supporting the resilience of the natural environment.

Responses to Fees and Charges 2022/2023 Consultation

Response 1

I object to any increase in fees. I think that considering most taxi drivers in Sevenoaks are barely managing to keep a roof over their heads after having almost zero income for the past 18 months, another extortionate increase in fees and no increase to our income (in fact still currently far less than pre covid) is quite frankly disgusting. We get absolutely nothing extra every time these prices increase. Please for goodness sake stop with the annual increases and let us catch a break! The larger firms might be able to swallow these fees but you're alienating your smaller independent drivers, who are the ones who actually provide the best service to people in Sevenoaks.

Also, it really is about time Sevenoaks DC rewarded adoptees of electric vehicles for taxis. Please explain why this is the only district I know of to not do this? I personally have taken the step to drive the first fully electric vehicle as a taxi in sevenoaks (possibly still the only one) and I have not received a single benefit from it.

Private hire prices should also be in line with hackney carriage as the vehicle test is the same. The only difference is that we complete a knowledge. Our taxi meters don't even get road tested anymore yet we get overcharged for the privilege.

Back to point, this is NOT the time to increase charges, we pay over any above already. Give us a break please.

Response from 44 Licence Holders

As per the email dated 4th November 2021 regarding the proposed increase of fees for Taxi and Private Hire Licesing 2022/23, on behalf of taxi drivers in Sevenoaks, we strongly object the increase in fees.

For the past year and a half, taxi drivers have been severely affected by the COVID-19 pandemic and some are still trying to make up for the losses they incurred during lockdowns. The increased fees will contribute as an additional financial burden to many taxi drivers in the local area as for many that is their only source of income. Nevertheless, driving costs are also constantly increasing with petrol and service charges becoming increasingly more expensive. That is why we believe that the Council, in addition to scrapping the proposed increased fees, should also implement new increased rates for taxi and private hire drivers.

Our proposed new rate are as follows

Charge for the first 880 yards (5/10 mile) or part thereof Pounds 4 Pence 20 Then each additional 176 yards aprox (1/10 mile) Pounds 0 Pence 30

Waiting time for each period of 1 minute Pounds 0 Pence 50

For hiring begun between 10pm and 7am (except all Bank & Public holidays)

Reason for recommendation:

A request accompanied by a petition from licensed drivers has been received to increase the charges set out in the Council's current approved tariff.

Introduction and Background

- The Council exercises a discretionary power to set the maximum fares for Hackney Carriages within the District. The Council has no power to control the fares charged by Private Hire Vehicle Operators.
- Please note that the fare set will be the maximum fare that can be charged and that Hackney carriage drivers have the right to charge a lower amount should they wish to do so.
- The current fare tariffs have been in operation since 1 January 2019 and are displayed in **Appendix A**.
- 4 During consultation in relation to the setting of taxi fees, a proposal was put forward supported by 44 license holders to increase the current Hackney Carriage fare tariff.
- The reasons set out in this proposal for an increase are:

 a) to assist the trade in making up for losses incurred during covid lockdowns, and

- b) that driving costs are constantly increasing with petrol and service charges becoming increasingly more expensive.
- 6 This proposal is at Appendix C
- 7 The changes proposed are:
 - Charge for the first 880 yards (5/10 mile) or part thereof Pounds 4 Pence 20.
 - Then each additional 176 yards aprox (1/10 mile) Pounds 0 Pence 30
 - Waiting time for each period of 1 minute Pounds 0 Pence 50
 - For hiring begun between 10pm and 7am (except all Bank & Public holidays)
- 8 The proposed changes are highlighted in the fare tariff at **Appendix B**.

Options for review or change

9 It is suggested that two options are available:

To direct the Licensing Service to carry out a consultation with all Hackney Carriage drivers to ascertain their views on any proposed increase and/or changes.

or

The Committee may decide that the request should not be considered at this time and decline to consult and leave the tariff as it is at present

Key Implications

Financial

The change in fare tariff agreed by the Committee will be formally advertised both on the Sevenoaks District Council website, and in a local newspaper, as well as notices erected both at the Argyle Road Reception and Dunbrik Garage.

Legal Implications and Risk Assessment Statement

The Council is following the appropriate process for determining applications for increases in the maximum fares chargeable by Hackney carriage proprietors. Any changes to the fare tariffs must be publicised for 14 days. Any unresolved objections to the proposal will be reported to a future meeting of this Committee.


As per the email dated 4th November 2021 regarding the proposed increase of fees for Taxi and Private Hire Licensing 2022/23, on behalf of taxi drivers in Sevenoaks, we strongly object the increase in fees.

For the past year and a half, taxi drivers have been severely affected by the COVID-19 pandemic and some are still trying to make up for the losses they incurred during lockdowns. The increased fees will contribute as an additional financial burden to many taxi drivers in the local area as for many that is their only source of income. Nevertheless, driving costs are also constantly increasing with petrol and service charges becoming increasingly more expensive. That is why we believe that the council, in addition to scrapping the proposed increased fees, should also implement new increased rates for taxi and private hire drivers. Our proposed new rates are as follows:

- Charge for the first 880 yards (5/10 mile) or part thereof Pounds 4 Pence 20 Then each additional 176 yards aprox (1/10 mile) Pounds 0 Pence 30
- Waiting time for each period of 1 minute Pounds 0 Pence 50
- For hiring begun between 10 pm and 7 am (except all Bank & Public holidays)

Overall, we feel that the Licensing Department Committee proposed changes are not in the best interest of the taxi drivers in Sevenoaks. We strongly urge you to consider our proposals.

Reason for recommendation: To ensure the Council complies with its statutory duty and ensures the licensing of gambling premises is self-financing.

Introduction and Background

- The Gambling Act 2005 Section 212 gives the Secretary of State power to make regulations prescribing the fees payable to the Licensing Authority. It also gives the power to devolve to Licensing Authorities in England and Wales the freedom to set fees for premises licence applications, subject to any constraints the Secretary of State may prescribe which includes a maximum fee level. The government has decided that for England and Wales, Licensing Authorities will determine their own fees for gambling premises licences but that the Secretary of State will prescribe the maximum fee payable for each category of licence.
- The maximum levels have been included in Appendix A in brackets for comparison purposes. The previous year's fees are printed in italics for your information. Those cells that are shaded in the body of the table are where we have reached the maximum fee level that may be set.
- There is an initial fee to cover the cost of application and an annual fee.
- 4 Licensing Authorities have been asked to set fees to ensure full cost recovery and that the fee levels represent fairness and value for money for the gambling industry. All Licensing Authorities must set their fees upon a

cost recovery basis only and will be required to review their fee levels on an annual basis to ensure this.

Fees must be set for all types of premises licence and Temporary Use Notices (TUNs):

Premises Types:

- Casino
- Bingo
- Betting Office (off-course)
- Tracks (on-course betting)
- Adult Gaming Centres
- Family Entertainment Centres
- 6 Fees must be set by each Licensing Authority for the following:
 - Application for a (new) premises licence
 - Application to vary a premises licence
 - Application to transfer the licence
 - Application for re-instatement of the premises licence
 - Application for a provisional statement
 - Application for a premises licence for a premises which already has a provisional statement
 - Fee to accompany a request for a copy of the premises licence
 - Fee to accompany a notification of change of circumstances (only relevant change is that of address)
 - Fee to accompany a temporary use notice
- 7 The District currently has six betting premises. There are no other gambling premises currently operating in the District.

The betting premises are:

- William Hill Swanley
- Betfred Swanley
- Ladbrokes Swanley
- Coral St John's Hill, Sevenoaks
- Coral London Road, Sevenoaks
- Coral Edenbridge
- The type of tasks involved in Gambling premises application include assistance to applicant, checking of an application upon receipt, processing the application, assess representations for relevance, undertake informal mediation, undertaking site visits where necessary. Once processed determining the licence or arranging a hearing and holding a hearing,

- notification of the decision, prepare and issue the licence, update the records/register, appeal preparation and holding an appeal hearing.
- The result of the calculations is set out in Appendix A of the report. There are three figures for each licence type/fee. The figure in bold font is the new proposed fee, the figure in brackets is the maximum fee set by the legislation and the figure in italics is the existing fee. Those cells that are shaded in the body of the table are where we have reached the maximum level of fee that can be set.
- The fees have been set for 2022-2023 to include the current inflationary cost of 2% set by Sevenoaks District Council.

Other options Considered and/or rejected

If the Licensing Committee were minded not to approve these fees the Council would not be able to meet the Council's Service and Budget Plan or ensure the licensing of Gambling premises was self-financing.

Key Implications

The cost of licence fees takes into account the need to maintain a 'self financing' position for the service. The proposals contained in this report will achieve this.

Reason for recommendation: The Licensing Department has not received or processed an application for a Sexual Establishment within the Sevenoaks District, therefore the fees have not been changed from those agreed in 2021.

Introduction

- The Council is required to review any charges which it makes for licences and other associated items, from time to time.
- The Council must seek to recover the costs associated with processing applications for licences as well as the administration and monitoring of compliance with conditions. The fees charged should be capable of withstanding legal challenge, should the need arise.
- It is not permitted to make a surplus or to subsidise licence holders so where necessary fees are adjusted in succeeding years to achieve and maintain the correct balance.
- The cost to the Council of this work is regularly checked and real time costs are used in compiling the figures. Where it is possible to reduce costs by use of more efficient working this is reflected in the charges made.

As the Licensing Department has not received or processed an application for a Sexual Establishment within the Sevenoaks District, the fees have not been changed from those agreed in 2021.

Sex Establishment Licensing:

- The fees for applications made under Schedule 3 of the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1982, have previously been calculated by examining the time it could take to process an application.
- The tasks involved with processing an application include assisting the applicant, checking the validity of an application, assessing representations, formal mediation and site visits.
- 8 The Council does not currently have any Sexual Entertainment venues.
- As the Council is unable to demonstrate any additional costs involved with the processing of applications made under this Act (due to the point raise in section 8 above), the Licensing Department proposes to keep these fees the same as those set in 2021.
