

**Advice to Sevenoaks Joint Transportation Board:** The Joint Transportation Board is asked to endorse the following recommendations, that:

- (a) the representations received during the statutory consultations in respect of the proposed conversion of an existing pay-&-display parking bay into a rapid charging point/parking bay for electric taxis and to granting a licence to install a charging point on the public highway in South Park, Sevenoaks, together with Officers comments, which are detailed in Appendix A to this report, be noted;
- (b) the relevant objections received during the statutory consultations be set aside;
- (c) The Kent County Council (Various Roads in the District of Sevenoaks) (Prohibition and Restriction of Waiting and Loading and Unloading and On-Street Parking Places) (Amendment 38) Order 2022 be made, as published, and a licence to install a rapid charging point for electric taxis on the public highway be granted; and
- (e) the objectors be notified of the decision.

#### Reason for advice:

The provision of charging points/parking bays for electric vehicles is aimed at supporting and promoting green travel and providing better management of the public highway.

#### Introduction

- 1 Kent County Council has received Government funding towards charging infrastructure for electric taxis in the County, and has commissioned a service provider to install and maintain the infrastructure.
- A potential viable site for a rapid charging point/parking bay for electric taxis has been identified in South Park, Sevenoaks. The site uses an existing onstreet pay-&-display parking bay.
- Before the pay-&-display parking bay can be "converted" into a rapid charging point/parking bay for electric taxis, the traffic regulation order covering the bay must be amended and an associated statutory consultation undertaken.
- 4 The service provider would need a licence to install the charging equipment on the public highway, which also requires a statutory consultation.
- Both statutory consultations were undertaken simultaneously during October/November 2021, and the purpose of this report is for the Board to consider the feedback from the consultations and Officers' comments, which are detailed in Appendix A, and to consider the advice to endorse the report recommendations.

## Background

- Kent County Council has received a funding grant from the Government Office for Low Emission Vehicles (OLEV) towards charging infrastructure for electric taxis in the County, and has entered into a contract with a service provider for the provision and maintenance of the infrastructure.
  - 7 A number of potential sites for a rapid charging point/parking bay in the Sevenoaks District have been identified and considered, but few of these were viable either on highways grounds or due to the absence of a suitable electricity supply nearby (it should be noted that charging points cannot be sited on existing taxi ranks for legal reasons).
- However, a potential viable location for a rapid charging point/parking bay for electric taxis was identified, in liaison with the supplier, on the south side of South Park, Sevenoaks just east of the entrance to the South Park (Stag Theatre) car park.
- This site uses an existing two-space on-street pay-&-display parking bay, and was chosen because of its proximity to the town centre and taxi ranks, and because it has a wide footway upon which to site a rapid charging point and a suitable electricity supply nearby.

- The proposed parking bay would be available for use by licensed electric or hybrid electrically charged taxis only, with a maximum stay of 1 hour and no return within 2 hours
- In order to "convert" the existing on-street pay-&-display parking bay into a parking bay for electric taxis, Kent County Council must make an amendment order, the effect of which will be to amend the parent traffic regulation order covering the parking bay, namely the Kent County Council (Various Roads in the District of Sevenoaks) (Prohibition and Restriction of Waiting and Loading & Unloading and On-Street Parking Places) (Consolidation) Order 2013, as amended.
- Description of extent of the parking bay in the 2013 Consolidation Order to be amended to reflect extent of parking bay marked on the road.
- The proposed amendment order would be entitled The Kent County Council (Various Roads in the District of Sevenoaks) (Prohibition and Restriction of Waiting and Loading & Unloading and On-Street Parking Places) (Amendment 38) Order 2022 (hereafter known as "TRO 2013 Amendment 38".
- In accordance with national legislation, this process requires a statutory consultation over a 21 day period and the consideration of any representations received, before TRO 2013 Amendment 38 can be made.
- Additionally, national legislation requires that a statutory consultation be undertaken with frontagers over a 28 day period, before a licence can be granted to a service provider to install objects and structures on the public highway, such as a rapid charging point.
- The statutory consultations for TRO 2013 Amendment 38 and for the proposal to grant a licence for installing the charging point on the public highway in South Park were undertaken simultaneously over a 28 day period from 21 October to 19 November 2021 by Sevenoaks District Council, as agent to Kent County Council.
- During the statutory consultations, 5 responses were received; 2 objecting to 3 and in favour of the proposals, redacted details which are contained in Appendix A to this report.
- The purpose of this report is for the Board to consider the objections received and Officers' comments, which are detailed in Appendix A, and to consider the advice to endorse the report recommendations.

## Other options Considered and/or rejected

The feasibility and desirability of upholding the objections detailed in Appendix A, and abandoning the proposal was considered. However, because the proposals are support and promote green travel, and hence the District Council's Net Zero ambitions, this options was not recommended.

## **Key Implications**

#### **Financial**

The costs incurred in undertaking the statutory consultations and in making TRO 2013 Amendment 38 can be met from Section 106 funding associated with the West Kent Cold Stores development in Dunton Green.

The costs incurred in installing the rapid charging point/parking bay for electric taxis can be met from Kent County Council's funding grant from OLEV.

## **Legal Implications**

Kent County Council must make traffic regulation order under the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 in order to "convert" the existing on-street pay-&-display parking bay into a parking bay for electric taxis.

Before making a traffic regulation order, a statutory consultation procedure must be followed in accordance with The Local Authorities' Traffic Orders (Procedure) (England and Wales) Regulations 1996.

Objections made to the traffic regulation order received during this statutory consultation (other than frivolous or irrelevant ones) that are not withdrawn are reported to the Sevenoaks Joint Transportation Board for advice.

The terms of reference for the Sevenoaks Joint Transportation Board allow it to provide advice to the Sevenoaks District and Kent County Councils, who will normally act in accordance with its views. If the Councils are minded to act otherwise, no decision will be taken until after a discussion with the Chairman and Vice Chairman of the Board.

Before a licence can be granted to a service provider under Section 115 of Part VIIA of the Highways Act 1980 to install objects and structures on the public highway, such as a rapid charging point, a statutory consultation must be undertaken with frontagers.

#### Risk Assessment

There are no additional risks identified that are outside those already covered within the standard Risk Assessment for carrying out parking enforcement on the Public Highway.

## **Equality Assessment**

The decisions recommended through this paper have a remote or low relevance to the substance of the Equality Act. There is no perceived impact on end users.

## **Net Zero Implications**

Members are reminded of the Council's stated ambition to be Net Zero with regards to carbon emissions by 2030. The decisions recommended in this paper directly impact on this ambition. The impact has been reviewed and there will be a decrease on carbon emissions produced in the district as a result of this decision.



#### **OBJECTIONS/COMMENTS RECEIVED**

#### 1. Objection

I would like to see you putting this somewhere else, maybe on the far side of the car park behind the Stag Theatre. There are not enough free car parking spaces for the residents of this area, I would not like to see this one taken by a taxi that can charge anywhere in Sevenoaks as they are in a car. So many older residents use those free spots that are close to the centre of town or they are sick and visiting the doctor's office. I would think you will be hearing from the doctor also that they are not in favour of this location.

#### 2. Objection

There is a considerable number of large lorries going in and out of the Exchange building in front and behind the proposed siting of this charging point.

Obviously there is constant traffic in and out of the Stag CP just beyond the proposed site and recycling lorries turning into and out of the Stag CP. Small children regularly walk down to and from St Thomas' school in South Park

The office block opposite the proposed site have workers turning in and out of their car park. Their shredding vans park outside the office block and opposite the proposed site regularly shredding the paper from the offices which takes 30-60 minutes. The offices also have daily delivery vans parking opposite the proposed site delivering their office

supplied. The Post Office and open Reach vans constantly use this area for deliveries and in the case of Open Reach to gain access below the pavement/road for their broadband facilities

Coach parking - there are large coaches bringing the public to attend functions at the Stag who park in the area of the proposed site where their passengers disembark for the Theatre. The coaches then return to collect the passenger after the performance which means the coaches are parked in the proposed site area waiting to collect.

The Doctors Surgery just down from the proposed site regularly have disabled vans and chemist deliveries which all adds to the traffic movements.

There is a residential area opposite the proposed site with small children. There is already constant reversing and jockeying for any space that becomes available in this part of South Park. The road will become even more gridlocked with this extra proposed facility. Hopefully you will take our concerns into consideration and reject this proposal and instead locate the taxi charging bay and charging point within the Stag Car Park area. The other advantage to this location is that parked nose to nose four taxis at a time could use the charging facility.

#### 3. In Support

Sevenoaks Town Council's emerging Neighbourhood Development Plan Policy M9 supports measures that will encourage a shift towards the use of greener modes of transport by businesses and residents. This includes encouraging businesses to move to electric fleets and introducing charging points in appropriate public locations.

Charging points are needed

#### 5. In Support

There are electric and hybrid taxis working in Sevenoaks, and it is sensible to provide charging points for them. It would also be sensible, indeed very desirable, to provide them for local residents. How about providing one for residents next to the taxi charging bay, and installing them at the same time? Must be better than a bit-by-bit approach. Also needed is an electric or hybrid vehicle charging point in each road in Parking Zone A, where so few residents have off-road parking.

#### **OFFICERS' COMMENTS**

There is ample short-stay parking facilities in this locality to cater for the loss of two onstreet bay & display parking spaces that would arise from converting the parking bay into a charging bay for electric taxis, both off-street in the South Park (Stag Theatre) car park and on-street in South Park and other neighbouring streets.

Vehicles already park in the existing pay & display parking bay, so it is unlikely that converting it into a charging bay for electric taxis would be detrimental to other road users.


The narrow profile of the electric vehicle charging point would mean that it is unlikely to significantly impact on pedestrians using the wide footway in which it would be sited, or on the visibility of drivers emerging from nearby accesses.

The yellow line restrictions can be used to set down/pick up passengers and make deliveries.

Sevenoaks District Council is currently investigating the feasibility and desirability of providing electric vehicle charging points in its car parks with another service provider.

Summary: KCC to update Edenbridge Town Council on the results of a recent feasibility study and to agree next steps.

#### **Update**

At the JTB meeting of 9<sup>th</sup> March KCC officers advised that the Schemes Planning & Delivery Team had undertaken an initial desktop study and site visit and had determined that further investigation was needed to gather more information about the site (Marlpit Hill / Hilders Lane / Hillcrest Road).

At the same meeting, it was advised that following programmed resurfacing, the buff coloured high friction surfacing on the approach to the crossroads would be extended. This was expected to better highlight the presence of the junction to motorists and assist braking vehicles to reduce speed more efficiently.

KCC have since instructed one of their in-house consultants to undertake a more detailed feasibility study for this location. This has identified possible improvement measures which may be suitable. KCC are currently still reviewing the findings and will be liaising with Edenbridge Town Council regarding which measures could be taken forward.

KCC do not have an allocated budget for these measures and as such, part of our investigations will involve producing a schedule of costs for progressing any agreed scheme.

# Station Road and High Street Otford – Request for new waiting restrictions Assessment of proposals by KCC officers

at Station Road and High Street, Otford. This report outlines the

findings of those investigations.

## **For Information**

## 1.0 Introduction and Background

- 1.1 Kent County Council received petitions from Otford Parish Council requesting waiting restrictions within Station Road and High Street Otford. These petitions were presented to the Sevenoaks Joint Transportation Board meeting on 3rd December 2019. The request related to concerns regarding congestion, pedestrian accessibility and anti-social parking.
- 1.2 It was agreed at the JTB in September 2020 that KCC Officers would re-investigate this matter through collecting site data and discussions. The investigation was delayed until 2021, due to SPD's priority work on the Emergency Active Travel Fund, relating to the Covid19 pandemic.
- 1.3 Officers from Kent County Council met with on site with Cllr Irene Roy in December 2020 to look at the proposed locations and advised that a formal assessment would follow.

#### 2.0 Assessment

- 2.1 Applications for waiting restrictions are assessed following a set process which involves both a desktop study and site visit. Sites are scored based on a set of criteria. Those which meet the criteria for intervention are added to a waiting list with the top scoring applications being taken forward to consultation.
- 2.2 The request for waiting restrictions at Station Road, Otford has been assessed and taking into account all the evidence available to us, this location does not meet our criteria for intervention and therefore we have no current plans to introduce waiting restrictions here. Whilst we can appreciate the concerns raised, inconsiderate parking is an issue across the whole county and we ultimately have to review each request from a highway safety perspective. We receive many requests for the implementation of improvement and safety measures on the highway including waiting restrictions and, as such all requests are reviewed and prioritised. We use an evidence-based approach to prioritise investment in Casualty Reduction Schemes as we seek to

ascertain if there is any pattern of personal injury crash records for the past three years that could be addressed by engineering methods.

- 2.3 Having reviewed the personal injury collision record at this location for the last available 3-year period (currently up to 31<sup>st</sup> March 2021), there is no pattern of crashes, making it very difficult to prioritise this site above other sites where there is an evidenced history of incidents occurring.
- 2.4 The request for an extension to the times of operation for the existing restrictions on High Street, Otford has also been assessed. Officers have raised concerns that an extension of the operating times may have a negative impact on residents of the High Street who park their vehicles on this road.
- 2.5 Officers have advised that we would require the parish council to undertake an informal consultation to gauge the level of support locally for the proposals. Should the informal consultation be well-received, KCC would look to progress to a formal consultation.

#### 3.0 Conclusion

- 3.1 Having undertaken an assessment KCC would not support the introduction of waiting restrictions on Station Road.
- 3.2 KCC request that Otford Parish Council undertakes an informal consultation for the proposals to extend the operating times of the existing restrictions at High Street prior to a formal consultation taking place.

Shoreham Road, Shoreham

**Classification:** Information Only

Summary: Kent County Council have produced proposals for a speed limit reduction on Shoreham Road, Shoreham. A meeting is to be scheduled between KCC, Shoreham Parish Council and Eynsford Parish Council to agree next steps.

#### **Update**

KCC officers met with representatives from Shoreham Parish Council and with Cllr Irene Roy in December 2020 to discuss proposals for a reduced speed limit.

KCC officers advised that the results of a site investigation did not support the reduction of the existing national speed limit to 40 mph for the full length requested. However, a 40 mph speed limit would be feasible between the 30 mph gateway into Otford and a point just north of the layby opposite the junction with Station Road. The remainder of the requested length from north of the layby to north of the railway bridge would be suitable for a 50 mph speed limit.

Officers have also received a request from the neighbouring parish of Eynsford to extend the proposed 50 mph speed limit up to the 30 mph entry point into Eynsford. Initial investigations indicate that this proposal would be feasible.

Shoreham Parish Council have expressed reservations over the proposed length of the 40 mph speed limit and expressed a desire for the limit to extend further north. KCC officers have assessed this request but would not support the extension of the proposed limit. KCC officers are currently liaising with the parish council to come to a resolution. A joint meeting is to be arranged between KCC officers, Shoreham Parish Council and Eynsford Parish Council with Cllr Roger Gough also in attendance.

**Classification:** Information Only

Summary: Members will receive information on how Kent Police provide information on Road traffic crashes.

#### **Update**

Collisions are initially reported to Kent Police via various platforms, telephone, in person at a local Front Desk, online or in person if an officer attends. These records are either then migrated or entered into the CRASH (Collision Recording and Sharing) system which is also known as The STATS19 database. This database is a collection of all road traffic accidents that resulted in a personal injury and were reported to the police within 30 days of the collision.

In the main, Kent Police do attend all Fatal and the most serious life threatening or Life changing injury collisions and conduct an investigation into the causes of the incident. We know that officers only attend about 25% of all collisions across all severities (Fatal. Serious and Slight) on the Kent Road network (including Highways England). We receive around 3500 injury collisions per annum.

Once the data is input/migrated to the CRASH system, Kent Police do some data input, where the original data is missing with regards to the injury records. Said records are then exported weekly to the local authorities(LA's) so that we can sense-check and validate to the standards DFT set out, once complete these are forwarded onto DfT as part of the LA's statutory requirement.

For information, we generally receive injury collisions around 6-8 weeks after the incident, this is to allow the 30 day submission period and any additional work needed by the STATS 19 data officers at Kent Police.

There is no statutory requirement to report damage only collisions to Kent Police, we are aware that these are sporadic in their submission and mainly relate to those collisions where a reference number is required for insurance claims.

**Subject**: Brasted and Sundridge Temporary Average Speed Camera trial

## Summary

KCC are introducing a trial of average speed cameras along Main Road (A25) through the villages of Brasted and part of Sundridge (west of junction with Church Road/Chevening Road) starting February 2022 for a period of 4 months after which an additional 2 sites within Kent will be chosen to continue the trial (likely to be A252 in Ashford and A290 in Canterbury).

## 1.0 Background

- 1.1 A temporary average speed camera trial is proposed for the 2 villages of Brasted and Sundridge with Ide Hill following reports of speeding and aggressive driving on A25 for many years. The A25 is also used by all types of traffic when incidents or maintenance occurs on the M25 which causes a significant increase in congestion, noise and damage to the road infrastructure. This trial follows attempts to reduce speeding by other methods such as traffic calming through Brasted Village.
- 1.2 This trial is being promoted and supported by Brasted and Sundridge with Ide Hill Parishes along with Nick Chard, KCC elected Member for the area. It is proposed to take place for a period of 4 months and accompanies the automatic speed watch camera trial that is also taking place in Brasted (this trial is looking at how an automated camera operates compared to a manned speedwatch site). The trial will compliment the traffic calming measures implemented in Brasted.
- 1.3 The trial extents have been chosen to cover Brasted Village and as much of Sundridge Village as possible without including the traffic signals at the junction of the A25 with Church Road/Chevening Road and east towards the A21 as this junction would affect the average speeds. It is recognised that the east part of Main Road, Sundridge will not be covered by the trial and that in this location speed limit compliance is poor however this would require an additional 2 cameras. Unfortunately, the available funding does not allow for the inclusion of additional cameras, electrical supplies, and advance signing. With any trial it is necessary to manage the resources available and the overall considerations have to be balanced out with the finite budget and scope limitations.
- 1.4 The trial will include 2 cameras, one located at the start of the residential area west of Brasted and one west of The White Horse Public House car park in Sundridge. Signing of the cameras will also be necessary on the lead up to their locations see Appendix A Extent of trial area and camera locations. Each camera will detect speeds in both directions and will operate 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. There will

be infrared lights to allow night-time operation. The infrared light is not visible so there will be no additional light pollution.

- 1.5 To understand the effects of the trial on this location, before and after speed surveys will be undertaken and KCC we will be conducting an extensive evaluation programme including residents' surveys to consider perceptions too. We will distribute a questionnaire to understand existing views and attitudes prior to the cameras being installed and will then follow up with another questionnaire on completion of the trial.
- 1.6 Residents and businesses are encouraged to access and complete the questionnaire which is hosted by Kent County Council on the link below:

- 1.7 The initial questionnaire survey is available now and will be open until 16 January 2022 with the cameras intending to be operational from February 2022.
- 1.8 It should be noted that this is a trial and the success or not of the average speed cameras will not necessarily mean that they will become permanent fixtures in this location.
- 1.9 The trial is being fully funded from KCC's Local Transport Plan allocation 2021-22.



**Subject**: Response to request for 20 mph speed limit in central Sevenoaks

Classification: Information Only

Summary: KCC have carried out an initial feasibility which indicates that a reduced speed limit may be suitable, however further investigations are required.

#### **Update**

An initial assessment in terms of feasibility and suitability has been made of the petitioner's request for a 20 mph speed limit in central Sevenoaks. This assessment has found that a 20 mph speed limit may be suitable, however further investigations are required.

The findings indicate that the roads proposed by the petitioner to be included in a 20 mph limit can be broadly divided into three main categories:

- 1. Where current average speeds are 24 mph or below;
- 2. Where current average speeds are between 24 28 mph and;
- 3. Where current average speeds are above 28 mph

Where speeds are 24 mph and below, we can look to introduce a 20 mph speed limit using signing and road markings only. Where speeds are between 24 – 28 mph, we will need to assess whether additional lighter touch / 'psychological' traffic calming measures may be needed to help ensure that a new reduced speed limit is in the main self-enforcing. Any sections where the average speeds are above 28 mph are likely to require traditional physical traffic calming features.

We are still awaiting the findings of studies into the area wide 20 mph speed limits in Tonbridge and Faversham which will help inform our approach going forward on a countywide level. We do not currently have a dedicated budget for new 20 mph speed limits, so the next stage of investigations will involve producing a schedule of costs to be met before any outline design on suitable measures can be undertaken.

Summary: This report updates Members on the identified schemes approved for construction

#### 1. Introduction

This report provides an update and summarises schemes that have been programmed for delivery in 2021/22 and 2022/23.

Kent County Council has recently published a forward works programme for the next five years covering planned maintenance of our highway assets. It is in two parts: the first concerns the next two years (2021/22 - 2022/23), and most of the sites included have already been verified by our engineers. The second part relates to years three to five of our five-year programme (2023/24 - 2025/26), and is largely based on data from our asset management systems, so may be subject to more changes as the schemes are verified.

This programme is subject to regular review and may change for a number of reasons including budget allocation, contract rate changes, and to reflect our changing priorities. The programme and extent of individual sites within the programme may also be revised following engineering assessment during the design phase, and additional sites may be added or others advanced if their condition deteriorates rapidly so that we need to react in order to keep the highway in a safe and serviceable condition.

### **Local Growth Fund**

### Local Growth Fund programme update for Sevenoaks Borough

The Department for Transport (DfT) added £100m to the Local Growth Fund (LGF) pot in order to fund Local Sustainable Transport Fund Style schemes. KCC subsequently submitted four Local Sustainable Transport Fund (LSTF) capital bids 1) East Kent – A network for Growth, 2) Kent Thameside – Integrated door-to-door journeys and 3) West Kent – Tackling Congestion.
